Kids win with concepts

Children used their creative abilities to crack a conceptual challenge.

Last November, the Child and Adolescent Health Service launched an art competition that asked kids to represent the service's visions and values.

Those qualities were listed as compassion, collaboration, equity, respect, excellence and accountability.

The competition, which closed on New Year's Eve, was open to under 16-year-olds, but all the winners last week were aged between nine and 11.

Last week, Health Minister

Roger Cook met the six competition winners at Perth Children's Hospital to present their certificates and prizes.
